## What you see from your TRAIN WINDOW

Leaving Central Station, Chicago, your train passes along the park-fringed lake shore through the attractive residential districts of Chicago's South Side, past the University of Chicago, Jackson Park, the Museum of Science and Industry. From there the route passes through the following cities and towns in the order shown.

HOMEWOOD, ILL.—Established in 1834 as a residential center, is within easy commuting distance of Chicago's business loop. Its proximity to major highway and seaway transportation routes affords an ideal location for business and light industry. Population in excess of 13,000.

**KANKAKEE**, ILL.—On the historic Kankakee River—population over 27,000. An important manufacturing center. A major Illinois State Hospital is located here.

**CHAMPAIGN-URBANA**, ILL.—Combined population over 74,000. Home of the great University of Illinois with a student enrollment of over 18,000. A portion of the campus and the stadium may be seen from the train on the south edge of Champaign.

MATTOON, ILL.—Population 18,000. A diversified, central Eastern Illinois city. An agricultural, commercial, industrial, oil and transportation center.

**EFFINGHAM**, **ILL.**—The Indianapolis branch of the Illinois Central joins the main line here. Population over 7,600. Manufacturing is the economic background of this thriving community.

CENTRALIA, ILL.—Center of the great Illinois oil fields, many producing wells operate along the Illinois Central right-of-way. Illinois Central car building and repair shops are located at this important division point. Oil refineries, coal mines, peach and apple growing and manufacturing are among its many industries. Population over 16,000.

CARBONDALE, ILL.—The St. Louis line of the Illinois Central joins the main line here. Population 11,000. Home of Southern Illinois University. Nearby is Crab Orchard Lake, the largest artificial lake in Illinois.

ANNA, ILL.—Population 4,400. Center of a great orchard country. Hundreds of cars of fruit are loaded in Anna for shipment during the season.

NORTH CAIRO, ILL.—Just south of here is the historic old river town of Cairo, where Mark Twain often visited. Immediately south of North Cairo the train crosses the Ohio River into Kentucky over the famous Illinois Central bridge. Original bridge built in 1889, this bridge—nearly two miles long, was replaced by new structure in 1952.

FULTON, KY.—Here the route to Florida turns southeastward, and the line from Louisville joins the main line of the Illinois Central to Memphis and New Orleans. Fulton is a busy town of 7,350 population with many diverse industries.

JACKSON, TENN.—Population 40,000. An important agricultural center, also many lumber and cotton products are manufactured here. Home of Union University, Lambuth College, the West Tennessee Agricultural Experiment Station of the University of Tennessee; and Lane College (Negro). Home of "Casey Jones" of railroad fame.

**CORINTH, MISS.**—A busy city of approximately 15,000 population with important manufacturing of diverse industries. Gateway to Shiloh National Park, Pickwick Dam and Lake.

BIRMINGHAM, ALA.—"Youngest of the World's Great Cities," the only place on earth where coal, iron ore and limestone (the three essentials of making steel) are found in commercial quantities. Population 621,000. Birmingham is the southeastern terminal of the Illinois Central. Between Birmingham and Albany, Ga., your train operates over the rails of the Central of Georgia Ry.

**COLUMBUS, GA.**—Population 135.000. Industries include the manufacture of machinery and textiles and food processing. Fort Benning is located here. The train schedule goes on Eastern Time.

ALBANY, GA.—Here your train connects with the Atlantic Coast Line. Its industries are mostly engaged in processing of agricultural products. A famous radium spring is located here.

JACKSONVILLE, FLA.—Population 228,300. Business capital of the State of Florida, with many manufactures and industries. Its attractions as a vacation resort are outstanding. Jacksonville is the railroad gateway to and from All Florida.

ST. AUGUSTINE, FLA. —Oldest city in the United States. Relics of its romantic past may be seen, including old Castillo de San Marcos, Potter Wax, Lightner and Ripley Museums. Marineland, the home of the famous Marine Studios, is located 18 miles south of St. Augustine.

**DAYTONA BEACH, FLA.**—Here is the world's most famous sea beach with sands so firm and smooth that automobile speed records are made on them.

NEW SMYRNA BEACH, FLA.—A busy year-round historic resort and business city on the Atlantic Ocean.

TITUSVILLE, FLA.—Known for its fruit and fishing and has developed a substantial boat building business. It is also the home of the Air Force Missile Test Center.

COCOA-ROCKLEDGE, FLA.—This is the gateway to Merritt Island in the heart of the Indian River citrus country, unexcelled fresh and salt water fishing, and is known as the salt water trout capital of the world. It is nationally known as the launching site of the satellites.

MELBOURNE, FLA.—An Indian River resort and a shipping point for fruit, dairy and poultry products. Excellent yacht basin within a block of business district.

**VERO BEACH, FLA.**—Famous McKee Jungle Gardens only 3 miles south of this prosperous resort and agricultural community. Ocean bathing, fine fishing.

FORT PIERCE, FLA.—"Vacation Land for the Whole Family." Has two ocean beaches, superb fresh and salt water fishing, 18-hole golf course. Citrus, cattle, tomato and winter vegetable center.

STUART, FLA.—On the St. Lucie River known as the sailfish capital of the world.

WEST PALM BEACH, FLA.—Center of the fabulous Palm Beaches resort area and commercial hub for the lush Everglades agricultural section. Dog racing and Jai-Alai in season. Winter home of Kansas City Athletics Baseball team.

LAKE WORTH, FLA.—Located on beautiful Lake Worth and the Atlantic Ocean and closer to the Gulf Stream than any other Florida East Coast Point.

**DELRAY BEACH, FLA.**—A vegetable growing region as well as a summer and winter resort. Just west of Delray is the world's Gladioli center.

FT. LAUDERDALE, FLA.—Population 75,000. Famous as the Venice of America because of 140 miles of scenic inland water ways.

HOLLYWOOD, FLA.—Ocean front bathing paradise and "golfingest" city in Florida. Year-round fishing, boating, water skiing and skin diving as well as horse racing at Gulfstream Park, dog racing at Hollywood Kennel Club, auto racing at Hollywood Speedway and Jai-Alai at Dania Fronton in season. Home of Riverside Military Academy and spring training home of Chicago White Sox farm teams.

NORTH MIAMI, FLA.—Convenient station serving Bay Harbor Islands, Surfside, Bal Harbour, Sunny Isles and the northern part of Miami Beach.

MIAMI, FLA.—Queen City of the South. Unmatched climate and host to nationally famous sporting events. In less than fifty years this city has grown from a mangrove swamp to a cosmopolitan city of tropical islands linked by waterways.

**GAINESVILLE, FLA.**—A city beautiful, and home of the University of Florida.

OCALA, FLA.—Thoroughbred horse ranches, citrus groves, adjacent to famed Silver Springs.

LEESBURG, FLA.—Claimed as "Bass Capital of America." Located between freshwater Lakes Griffin and Harris.

CLEARWATER, FLA.—Practically surrounded by clear salt water, the Gulf of Mexico. Florida's newest convention city.

ST. PETERSBURG, FLA.—Called the Sunshine City. Provides recreation and amusement facilities to suit all ages and tastes. Home of Admiral Farragut Naval Academy Prep School, St. Petersburg Jr. College, and Stetson University's College of Law.

PALATKA, FLA.—Home of famed Palatka Ravine Gardens, a municipally owned sub-tropical fairyland containing more than 100,000 azalea plants.

**DE LAND, FLA.**—The Athens of Florida. Four miles from the beautiful St. Johns River and home of Stetson University.

**SANFORD, FLA.**—Located on the St. Johns River. Has the largest and oldest Cypress tree in America nearby.

WINTER PARK, FLA.—Rollins College beautifully situated in the heart of town. The city is located in an incomparable tropical setting.

**ORLANDO, FLA.**—Located in the heart of the citrus growing region. The home of the famous Tangerine Bowl annual football game. World's largest training headquarters of harness horses.

KISSIMMEE, FLA.—Cow Capital of Florida and home of the Silver Spurs Riding Club which stages a midwinter and summer Rodeo.

HAINES CITY, FLA.—Groves, packing houses and canning plants in the immediate vicinity produce and process more than 12,000,000 boxes of citrus annually. Only a short distance from famous Cypress Gardens.

LAKELAND, FLA.—"World's Citrus Center." Highest city in Florida. Home of Florida Southern College. Spring training quarters of Detroit Tigers and their minor league system. Annual Santa Claus Bowl Football Game.

TAMPA, FLA.—Located on Beautiful Tampa Bay. A vigorous industrial city, containing a scenic waterfront bustling with activity. Home of Florida State Fair and famous Gasparilla Pirate Festival, also the University of Tampa. Horse racing at Sunshine Park begins each January.

BRADENTON, FLA.—Located on the Manatee River. Spring training headquarters Milwaukee Braves Baseball Club, also Louisville Colonel Baseball Club.

SARASOTA, FLA.—Famous fishing grounds in Bay and Gulf waters. Ringling Art Museum, Sarasota Jungle Gardens, Reptile Farm.


